DEAR FRIENDS OF TND,

The communities served by The Neighborhood Developers are no strangers to crisis. When the NECCO candy factory in Revere closed overnight, it left 230 workers out of a job. When Everett's housing prices rose significantly in recent years, seniors on fixed incomes struggled to meet their basic needs. And when COVID-19 first hit last year, Chelsea residents contracted the virus at a rate six times higher than the rest of Massachusetts.

Around the country, people were shocked by the inequities and injustices the pandemic revealed. But as a community development corporation, it is part of our mission to respond to the needs of our community, and we were prepared to address these disparities. Thanks to the dedication of our staff, partners, advocates, donors, and community leaders, we dove in headfirst to tackle problems as they arose, in ways you'll read about throughout this report.

With vaccination underway, we're all breathing a sigh of relief. But the equity gap has only widened, and we can't cure the structural barriers to economic security and mobility with a shot.

It all starts with housing. Housing is a human right not only because of our basic need for shelter, but because it is the foundation on which we build the rest of our lives. So while TND is building affordable homes at an unprecedented rate, we are also addressing obstacles that prevent people from staying in their homes. We have a unique perspective on this work: As both a landlord and a non-profit that builds the leadership among housing advocates, we understand the economic pressures on both sides, and work to find new ways to align landlords' interests with those of their tenants.

Our families and neighborhoods have experienced terrible loss and grief, and there's still a long road to recovery. TND will remain by their side, collaborating, building, and advancing equity and racial justice.





HOME IS **PREVENTATIVE** MEDICINE

We've long known that safe, stable, affordable housing is critical to people's wellbeing. During 2020, we witnessed how a home protects people from disease. In fact, COVID-19 infection rates were consistently lower in our Chelsea and Revere properties than in the surrounding communities. The supportive services delivered by our dedicated Resident Services team, coupled with TND's well-maintained homes, is good preventative medicine. The team delivered 4,000 wellness calls to our seniors and hundreds of pounds of groceries and meals. Households that lost employment benefited from help applying for income and rental assistance.

Everyone deserves the protection and security of a home, but in our communities, demand far outstrips supply. We received almost thirty times more rental applications than there are apartments in our new building on the rapidly gentrifying Revere waterfront.

We can't build our way out of the housing crisis, but we can build with an eye to equity. By developing affordable homes suitable for families and seniors we can help prevent displacement, and our neighborhoods can retain their unique culture and character. We set a goal of creating 325 new homes for 500 people by 2024, and remarkably, the number of new homes underway puts us 90% of the way there!

NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

In the face of the lockdowns and social distancing of 2020, strong community connections were a lifeline. Across Chelsea and Revere, we expanded our partnerships with local organizations and city agencies, and created opportunities for neighbors to support one another and advocate for their communities.

For years, Richard Flores only planned to stay in Chelsea through high school. "A lot of my friends' parents couldn't afford housing, and had to move to areas that were more affordable," he says. "I've lost a lot of friendships." Richard and his mother had trouble finding stable housing too, jumping from hotel to hotel until TND helped them access the resources to

afford a house in Chelsea. The experience inspired Richard to join the Housing Equity Committee, a TND-facilitated group of residents learning about and educating the community on tenants' rights, and activating residents to advocate for housing reforms. "You know when you have that friend to lean on when you're struggling?" he asks. "That's what TND and the Housing Equity Committee are for me. Without TND, I feel like I wouldn't have the right contacts or have gained the confidence to talk to people." Richard is headed to Harvard University in the fall, but has changed his mind about leaving Chelsea for good. "Participating, being able to engage with the community and give back, it's motivating me to not just leave for college but to come back and continue to work with the community."

CONNECTING RESIDENTS TO RESOURCES

When the pandemic hit, the hospitality, transportation, and retail sectors were devastated, causing unemployment in our communities to skyrocket. We knew that many of the employment gains made by those engaged with CONNECT vanished overnight. Thanks to the dedicated CONNECT team and with technical assistance provided by TND's partnership with Opportunity Communities, we quickly pivoted to respond to emerging needs.

Within two weeks of the state's shutdown order, CONNECT opened a resource hotline to help residents access unemployment support, SNAP food benefits, RAFT emergency rental assistance, and internet services. In just six months, we were able to secure more than \$1.4 million in RAFT rental assistance for Chelsea and Revere residents. Thanks to this and our other relief efforts and resident services, not a single TND tenant lost their home in 2020, and nearly 3,000 community members benefited from economic supports.





When COVID-19 forced many businesses to close, **Hayat Smith lost both of** her jobs and turned to TND for help. "My case manager would call me even outside of her working hours to ask how my kids and I were doing," Hayat recalls. "She gave me hope, mental boosts that refreshed me and reminded me that life gets better." Working with her case manager, Hayat applied for unemployment benefits and rental assistance. which covered two months of rent and enabled her to pay off other bills that were accumulating. Still, Hayat knew that her job prospects were murky, so she signed up for **CONNECT's Professional Development training,** which had recently moved online. "The class built my confidence and improved my skills in customer service," she says. "My resume improved and I was able to apply to more jobs and was offered higher pay." She now feels empowered, and credits **CONNECT** for her new. optimistic outlook.
